

General Information on Switzerland and the cantons of Basel-Stadt and Baselland

Switzerland is located in the heart of Europe, has a surface area of 41,000 square kilometers and over 8.5 million inhabitants. This landlocked country borders Germany to the north, France to the west, Italy to the south and Austria and Liechtenstein to the east.

There are three main geographic regions in Switzerland. The Swiss Plateau stretches from Lake Geneva in the southwest to Lake Constance in the northeast. The Jura lies on the northwestern edge of Switzerland. The western end of the Jura forms a natural border with France. The Swiss Alps lie in the south of the country, from the Austrian

border in the east to Lake Geneva in the west. The Swiss Alps have 48 peaks that are more than 4,000 metres above sea level. The Dufour Peak, 4634 m, is the highest summit in Switzerland.

The Swiss Confederation consists of 26 cantons, three of them are divided in half: Basel-City and Basel-Country, Obwalden and Nidwalden, Appenzell Ausserrhoden and Innerrhoden.

Switzerland has four official languages: German in the north, French in the southwest, Italian in the south and Romansch, which is only spoken in the southeastern canton of Grisons. English is also gaining importance as an unofficial but frequently spoken business language, particularly in main and tourist cities.

Basel is the third largest city in Switzerland with over 201.000 inhabitants. It is famous for its so-called 'tri-national' location – next to Germany and France.

Basel is home to a great number of historical sites including the town hall, the Münster of Basel and the charming old town. The city by the river Rhein features several traditional and international events such as Fasnacht, the annual swim in the Rhein and fairs like Art Basel and Basel World. Basel counts as one of the most important cultural cities in Switzerland and its famous museums, such as the Fondation Beyeler, the Tinguely and the Museum of Arts, attract visitors from all over the world. Concerts, festivals and sporting events fill the year with interesting cultural highlights.

Due to its small size everything in Basel is close and long commutes are not necessary. English is widely spoken and understood by shop owners and restaurant staff alike, but it is of course beneficial to learn some German, so that you can order your drinks in the local language. The Swiss appreciate every small effort you make.

Basel has a very good public transport system with a wide variety of trams, bus routes and local trains. At peak periods the roads can become blocked with traffic, so it is advisable to use local transport where possible.

What is Basel famous for? Basler Läckerli, the delicious hard spice biscuit made of honey, hazelnuts, almonds, candied peel, and the liqueur Kirsch.



Facts & Figures: Canton Basel-Stadt

Basel is located in the northwest of Switzerland. The river Rhein flows through Basel's cantonal territory. At only 37 square kilometers Basel-Stadt is the smallest canton in Switzerland and includes the city of Basel and the two outlying municipalities of Riehen and Bettingen.

Basel-Stadt provides important services to the surrounding areas in Baselland, France and Germany such as hospitals, educational facilities and cultural institutions. From Basel by train...




Facts & Figures: Canton Baselland

With an area of 518 square kilometers, Baselland is considerably larger than Basel-Stadt. It has about 291.000 inhabitants, of which 20 % are foreigners. The half-canton of Baselland consists of 86 municipalities which are divided into five regions: Arlesheim, Laufen, Liestal, Sissach and Waldenburg.

Economy

Basel is the most dynamic economic region in Switzerland and one of the most productive and innovative worldwide. Global companies in the pharmaceutical and chemical industry – Roche, Novartis, Syngenta and many others – have chosen Basel as their headquarters. Basel is the top location for life science and nanotechnology in Europe. In these sectors, as well as in biotech and medtech, many innovative research companies have been founded. Other important industries in Basel are finance and insurance, IT, architecture and design. In addition, the port of Basel contributes to economic growth, as it is the most important transport hub in the country. 10-12 % of Swiss imports reach the country through this port.



Best of Basel

Basel boasts many impressive buildings with historical and modern structures alike. Here is an overview of some of the landmarks in Basel.

Münster

The Basel Cathedral (Münster) was built in the 13th century and rebuilt after an earthquake in 1356. The Pfalz viewing platform behind the cathedral overlooks the Rhein and the Mittlere Brücke (Middle Bridge), the oldest bridge across the Rhein in Basel. This bridge dates to the 13th century.

Town Hall (Rathaus)

Built in the 16th century, the Town Hall is painted red and ornately decorated. During the day the public has access to the courtyard to admire the frescoes on the wall.

Tinguely Fountain

Its real name is Fasnacht Brunnen (carnival fountain) but is better known as Tinguely Fountain. The fountain, designed by the artist Jean Tinguely, is located in front of the City Theatre. Mechanical figures spout water and turn into beautiful ice sculptures in winter.

City gates

The three remaining city gates Spalentor, St. Johannstor and St. Albanstor date back to the 14th century. In 1860 the city wall was torn down to make way for the expansion of the city.

Dreiländereck

The tri-nation meeting point is the spot where Switzerland, Germany and France come together. The actual spot would be in the river Rhein, but a symbolic marker on a wharf has been erected.

Fähre (ferries)

Between the five bridges crossing the Rhein four small ferryboats transfer passengers from one side of the river to the other. The ferries are named after typical Basel figures: Wilder Maa, Leu, Vogel Gryff and Ueli. The boats are not motorised and use the current to move across the river.

Fasnacht/Carnival

Recognized by UNESCO as "Intangible Heritage", Basel is very proud of its carnival celebration, which brings everyday life to a standstill for three whole days in February/March. At 4 am on the Monday morning after Ash Wednesday, the "Morgenstraich" heralds the start of Carnival. Masked and costumed fife players and drummers march through the city and huge lanterns displaying parodies of events from the past year are paraded through the streets. The merrymaking lasts until Thursday 4 am, when the last carnival stragglers head home and a brigade of city cleaners comes to clear the streets of Basel from the thick carpet of confetti and other carnival remnants.



Fairs

Art Basel

Apart from Basel World, Art Basel is one of the biggest international fairs that takes place in Basel. Art Basel is the most important modern art fair worldwide and attracts artists, galleries and collectors from all over the world. Around 300 carefully selected exhibitors display their artworks during the fair. www.artbasel.com

Herbstmesse

The Basel Autumn Fair is the largest and oldest amusement fair in Switzerland. For two weeks Basel's city centre is turned into a large fairground. At seven locations around the city, rides, games and market and food stalls attract thousands of visitors from Switzerland and across the borders. www.herbstmesse.ch/en

Basel Jazz Festival

Leisure Activities & Excursions

Cycling and hiking

Swiss hiking trails are very well signposted. This makes them easy to follow, even without a map. There are plenty of hiking trails around Basel you can choose from. They have different levels of difficulty and lengths. Cycling and mountain biking are popular sporting activities in Switzerland. Skiing

There is no shortage of ski stations in Switzerland. Winter is one of the most beautiful times of the year, when the mountains come alive with skiers, snowboarders and sledgers. Fun can be had by all ages.

It is advisable to invest in some decent skiing clothing, which is relatively cheap here as it is readily available. It can be very cold in the mountains so buy some proper thermal skiing underwear (e.g. ODLO) and feel the difference. It is important to be warm. Don't forget protection for your eyes too; always take your sunglasses or goggles for the kids with UV protection and sunscreen.


